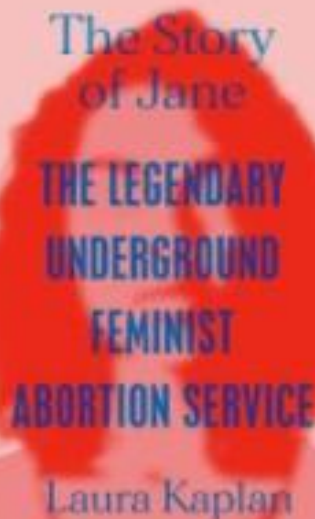
Women's History Month
